

### WARNING!

#### Theft from At Risk Adults Investigative Synopsis

On May 5, 2010, The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office in Golden, Colorado, received a theft report from an elderly female. The victim, who is 77 years old reported that a Hispanic male and female approximately 25-35 years old had knocked on her door and claimed to live in the neighborhood. The female asked male, who "acted" like he was developmentally disabled, if he needed to use the restroom and the elderly victim allowed them into the house.

While inside of the residence the female suspect initiated a conversation with the victim to keep her distracted, while the male stole jewelry and cash from the bedrooms. During the investigation it was discovered that similar cases had been reported throughout the Denver Metro area as well as jurisdictions along the eastern I-70 corridor. In each case the victims gave the following descriptions of the suspects:

**FEMALE SUSPECT:** Hispanic female between 25-35 YOA, 5'02" – 5'05", with a medium to "chunky" build.

**MALE SUSPECT:** Hispanic male between 25-35 YOA, 5'08 – 5'10", thin build, with short brown hair and wearing a baseball hat.

\* When describing the female victims gave differing descriptions of the females hair style and color, as well as the type of clothing the suspects wore. Some of the victims described the suspects as being well dressed and others stating the suspects appeared messy.

It appears that the suspects are targeting unsuspecting victims as they leave a shopping center and either contacting the victim in the parking lot or following the victims to their residence and coming back later in the day.

Once they contact the victim, the suspects either claim to live in the neighborhood or pretend to know the victim. The female initiates a conversation with the victim while the male takes jewelry and clothing from the home. In the cases where the suspects claim to live in the neighborhood, the female claims that their grandfather suffers from Alzheimer's and has locked them out of the house.

Adams County Sheriff's Investigators obtained surveillance video from a convenient store of a male and female, matching the description of the suspects, in blue Chevy crew-cab pick-up truck. The male paid for gas and merchandise using silver and half dollars stolen from earlier in the day. \*\* Victims and witnesses also reported seeing the suspects driving a white 90's 4 door sedan.\*\*

### Who Needs Extra Baggage? Lose the Bag . . . and Leave Your Grass Clippings on the Lawn!

Many Denver residents will receive new phone books on their doorsteps this summer. As your new books arrive, use it as the perfect opportunity to recycle your old phone books. **All phone books, whether they are yellow, blue or green, are accepted in your Denver Recycles purple cart.** Just be

sure to remove all magnets, plastic wrap and plastic bags. **Phone books are 100% recyclable**, so there is no good reason to not recycle them. In many cases phone books are even made from recycled paper, such as Dex's White & Yellow Pages. Recycled phone books can be made back into new phone books, paper, or other products such as insulation material, fruit packing trays, paperboard boxes and even animal bedding. ### 10 Ways to Protect Your Bicycle

Bicycle season is in full swing and, unfortunately, so is the increased opportunity for bicycle thefts. Now is the time to take measures to help prevent your bicycle from being stolen.

*Kickstand Magazine* suggests these 10 ways to protect your bicycle from theft.

1. Register your bicycle. This can be easily done by going to the City of Denver bicycle registration website [www.denvergov.org/bikeregistration.asp](http://www.denvergov.org/bikeregistration.asp). The Denver Police Department recovers hundreds of bicycles every year; however, due to the similar nature of so many bicycles, it is difficult to return them to their rightful owners without the serial number registration.
2. Always use a good lock ( using two different types of locks are even better)
3. Don't leave your bicycle in public places overnight.
4. Remember where you locked your bicycle. (Yes, it happens; just like forgetting where you parked your car.) Additionally, have an extra key.
5. Insure your bicycle through your homeowner insurance or other policies.
6. Lock your bicycle where it can be seen and be careful it is not locked to private property without permission.
7. Lock it to an immovable object.
8. Lock the wheels to the frame.

9. Remove all skewered parts as seat or wheels.
10. Make the appearance of your bicycle unique and very recognizable.


If your bicycle is stolen, report it to the Denver Police department by calling the non-emergency number 720.913.2000 or filing the report on-line by going to the [www.denvergov.org](http://www.denvergov.org) home page and selecting "Report a Crime" under the Police heading.

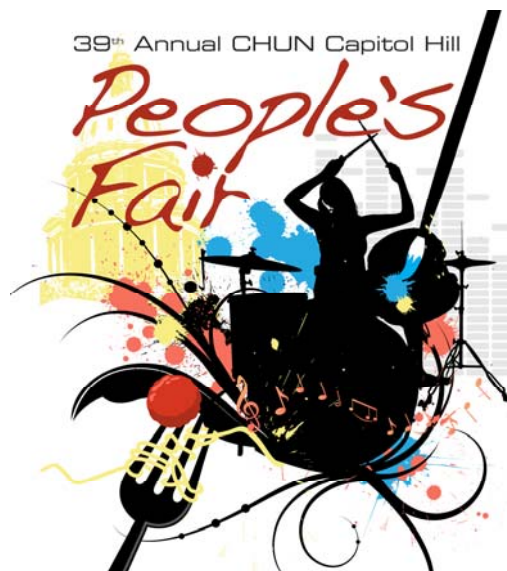

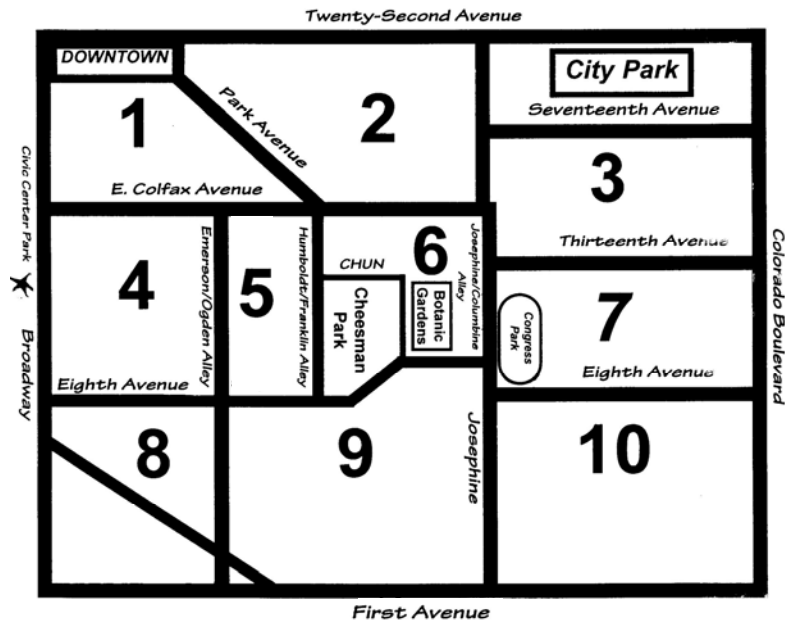
